Reflections

Peace in a Hostile World

¹⁵Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. ¹⁶Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. ¹⁷Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. ¹⁸If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all.

Romans 12:15-18

Lately, in the media and other public discourse, there is a lot of talking, but not much listening. There are many who are clamoring for attention, but not much is leading to meaningful outcomes. We are in a time when speaking less but speaking with intention will be a necessary discipline in order to bring healing in the world.

There is some misunderstanding of the “vow of silence” that is practiced in many religious communities. The vow is generally not to eliminate all speech, which always leads to comical thoughts about how one asks to pass the salt at dinner. The vow is to refrain from meaningless speech. The idea is that meaningless speech is anything that does not edify or build up relationships. So, one should only speak to assist a brother or sister. When meaningful speech is truly practiced, one must often thoughtfully consider if the words are indeed useful and worthy of disturbing the silence.

Very frequently, in the world today, speech is what we use to fill the gaps, to avoid awkward silence. However, in meaningful relationships, often periods of silence separate those moments when conversation goes deeper, when we find ourselves ready to say words that matter. When we are seeking to speak words that are of comfort or support, we need to think what will be helpful before we speak. When we seriously offer words of support or congratulations, we want to choose words that will reflect the support we are offering. In times of conflict, thoughtful, caring words can cut through repeated episodes of misunderstanding, or assumptions of malice. Often, what is needed is not so much agreement as a sense of having been recognized and understood. This does not take place through more words, but through wise words coupled with understanding.

To be “peaceable and to seek what is noble in the sight of all” must come from a solid base of courage and confidence that comes from a mature relationship with Christ. The greatest courage is shown in the ability to be wise and restrained, especially when others have strong emotions or deep investment in the divisions. We are confident in our value as God’s beloved children. So, we have a capability to be generous in compassion and listening, as we are cautious in the words we choose.

The need for healthy, listening Christians who are capable of sharing peace continues to grow, as the noise and hostility in the world is making it very difficult to hear one another. Christians who are committed to peace will stand out against the confusion and meaningless conflict. As we work together to be people with a commitment to wisdom and peace, our testimony will open hearts to God’s message of love and compassion.

Sermon: "Christians Live By Faith"

What does reconciliation look like in the world around us? How do we practice grace with people who have been destructive and untrustworthy in the past? To what degree do we guard against allowing people to be abusive and how do we open pathways for restoration? How do we seek the best for people who have been self-destructive and hurtful while being wise? How do we deal with long periods of waiting for healing or restoration?

11/10/2019

Sermon: "Christians Live Resurrection Hope"

Theme: Christians anticipate that their faith will face difficult times.

Purpose: For the congregation to consider how they might practice their prayer, meditation, and learning to have strength for difficult times.

Scriptures: 1 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17

Paul and the others did not come to deceive or "sell" the gospel but came to share what they had received themselves.

Luke 20:27-38 Sadducees question Jesus about the resurrection, but God is not the God of the dead, but of the living.

Questions:

What difference does the resurrection mean to our perspective and values for this life? How does God's promise of resurrection cause us to see suffering and injustice differently? In what ways do we trust in God's righteousness over and above the values of our earthly life? How do we become people who endure trials and hardships without being overwhelmed or discouraged? What do we know about God's promises of justice and righteousness, and how does that affect our thinking about this life and the life to come?

Coming Up in Worship (continued)

11/17/2019

Sermon: "Christians Share their Faith"

Theme: Christians do not attempt to change other people but share their love and knowledge of God as a gift of hope and peace to everyone they meet.

Purpose: We explore what it means to bring Christ to the people around us with love and respect.

Scriptures: 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13

The disciples worked to not be a burden to the people.

Isaiah 65:17-25
Promise that God will create a new heavens and new earth and will create a place of health, healing, and joy for the people.

Questions:

What does it mean to us that God's intention is to create a new heaven and new earth? How does our commission to share Christ's message of love flow from a work of healing and transforming our world? What difference does it make whether a person believes in God acting in supernatural ways that are outside of our responsibility, or whether we believe that God is working through us to bring healing and renewal to the world? What is each person's labor in the work of restoring our community and our nation? How do we motivate one another to labor on God's behalf?

11/24/2019

Sermon: "Christians Follow Christ"

Theme: God calls those who are faithful to place their relationship with Christ and faithfulness to serve above all other commitments and distractions.

Purpose: To examine what it means to make Christ the center of our life, and make a commitment to what is the center of our faith.

Scriptures: Jeremiah 23:1-6

Woe to the shepherds who scatter the sheep and do not practice righteousness.

Colossians 1:11-20

Be strong in the strength of the power that comes from God in Christ.

Questions:

In what ways does our personal faith in Christ affect our commitments to our family, our church, and to the world? How do we faithfully develop relationships which reflect Christ's love? How do we avoid falling prey to serving our own egos or interpreting our selfishness into God's call? What do we need to do in order to put Christ's gift of forgiveness first in our ways of speaking and acting towards others? What is it we need to practice regularly as Christians in order to be more focused on Christ than upon the fears and worries that often begin to dominate our thinking?





We received this message from Bill Andress from Trinity

Presbytery in South Carolina. This year's rainy season in South Sudan has been and continues to be extreme. Flooding is a major problem, especially in Boma State, of which Pibor is the capital. On Monday, October 28, the UN indicated that 167,000 people are at risk.

Rev. James Aleyi, the Executive Secretary of the Presbytery reported that virtually everyone is in water because almost all the high ground has flooded. The urgent need is transportation to higher ground (miles away). Until then, ready to eat food is needed because there is no way to cook. Wells and latrines have flooded, the latter polluting the water with human excrement; thus there is a need for safe water to drink. While a few people have died, most are stable but in water. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance and the Presbyterian Church of South Sudan (PCOSS/S's) counterpart are on the ground in Juba working to coordinate the church response.
